### FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Parish,

I want to start off with saying “THANK YOU” to all the children and youth who participated in the Christmas Tableau – you were ALL excellent and always make Christmas Eve extra special!!

I think you all know that I believe every month is a good month for self-reflection. And, what’s nice about January is that culturally this month lends itself quite well to looking back, and looking forward, towards what we hope for in this new year.

As we begin Ministry Year 2026 two things that have been on my heart are expanding service opportunities with our Mission Center; engaging with our youth and young adults in ways that they find meaningful. And to do this, I need your help – from our youth to our adults. So, please approach me if you’d like to work with me, ministry is better together 😊

And I want to share an article I read in the *Try Tank* newsletter: *What Young People Actually Notice*:

Adults often assume young people drift from faith because they lose interest. Research points to a different story. Josh Packard asked hundreds of youths and young adults to name the moments when faith felt most alive. Their answers rarely mentioned events, programs, or teaching. **Instead**, they described moments when an adult remembered something from a previous conversation, followed up after a hard week, or took their questions seriously without steering the conversation toward predetermined conclusions.” Events are good, but connections are better.

“**When that kind** of attention is present, faith gains traction. When it is absent, even the best ministry infrastructure struggles. In the study, 75% of young people said that being

listened to helped them stay open about faith and spirituality in the future. That is not a small number. That is a roadmap.”

Isn't this what we do well at St. Jude's – listen to each other and show that we care about each other. Our task now is to think about how do we do this with intention for our young people.

Stay mindful, stay curious, keep being willing to try out new things, keep sharing what we love with each other and others, and continue to care for our community. As God blesses us, let us share widely our blessings.

- November surplus of \$26.8K

- November YTD Net Operating Income a deficit of **\$33K**
  - Debt Reduction \$20K received
- November YTD Net Income a surplus of \$27K
  - Includes other Funds: VBS, FMM, LGBTQAI, COVID, Loan Payoff Fund
- Pledges \$9K above through the end of November
- Assets now \$187K up from \$139K
- COVID Monies are \$17K:
  - Plan to move \$5K to Loan Payoff Fund so amount will be \$25K
  - Plan to move remaining \$12K to FMM in lieu of HVAC repairs
- Asse Have spoken to Flagstar regarding loan payoff earlier than 4/2028

## ANNUAL GIVING UPDATE



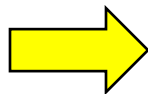
If you haven't sent in your Annual Pledge Card, please consider doing so, every pledge makes a difference to the vitality of the parish!

As of 12/23/2025 we have a commitment of 47 pledges for a total of \$204,798.00. Our desired goal for this year is \$265,000.00.

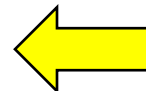
Last year we had 62 pledges for a total of \$222,404.00 with an average pledge of \$2,859.00. Thank you to everyone who has returned their Annual Pledge!

### **SURPRISE! Help US Collect Eggs to Celebrate Easter with Cascarones!**

Mo. Jimmie Sue and I met in San Antonio and that is where we started our family. Every year San Antonio has a celebration called "Fiesta" which began in 1891 as a commemoration of the heroes of the Alamo. Fiesta takes place during April each year. Cascarones are a big part of the Fiesta celebration. They are also a big part of Easter celebrations! So in San Antonio, cascarones abound every spring! For the purposes of Easter, they symbolize rebirth and Jesus' resurrection. Tradition has it that a person hit with a cascaron and sprinkled with the confetti inside is brought good luck for the year. And goodness!, good luck abounds this time of year! The tradition of making cascarones and, of course, "doing" cascarones traveled with our family no matter how far we moved from San Antonio. It is something that the children (and us) look forward to each year!

Here's what we need to do to make cascarones:



Collect empty egg shells throughout Lent. To do this, crack your eggs so that there is a small opening in the top. Small enough so that there is still lots of shell left behind but big enough to get confetti into. Shake or pour out the egg. Wash your egg shell out with a bit of soap and water. Let dry. You can store your empty egg shells in egg cartons, that's the best way to keep them safe until the cascarones are cracked on someone's head!

Bring the egg shells into church by **March 22nd**. I plan to make the cascarones with the youth and young at heart on March 22nd and March 29th at coffee hour.

Once we have empty egg shells, the next step is to dye them. You can decorate them just how you decorate Easter eggs. Once the dyed eggs are dry then we fill them with paper confetti and cover the opening by gluing tissue paper over the hole.



Here are some pictures of empty shells, dyed shells, and completed cascarones so you can see what I'm talking about! I am also more than willing to answer any questions and even do egg cracking demonstrations if needed. :)

I love this tradition and so does Mo. Jimmie Sue! We look forward to sharing it with our St. Jude's family! If you have any questions, feel free to call, text, email or catch me in person :)

### **BLESSING FOR YOUR HOME FOR THE NEW YEAR**

On January 11th, I invite you to gather with your family around your main entryway to your home. You will need a piece of white chalk. This is an eastern European tradition of inscribing a blessing above the main door writing the following on the door:

20 +C+M+B + 26.

The numbers represent the current year, and the letters have two meanings, the first being the Latin for "Christ, bless this house," and the second being the names of the magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar.

And as a family member writes in chalk, the others say this prayer:

*Peace be to this house, and to all who dwell in it. Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence, bless all who live here with the gifts of your love; and grant that they may manifest your love to all whose lives they touch. May they grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen them, and preserve them in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen.*
